INVITATION TO ATTEND SOUTH GPCME 2023

We are delighted to return to Te Pae in Christchurch, a great new conference facility. A very varied medial update programme awaits you. It was also refreshing to be able to mingle very normally in person last year and relationships were rekindled. The social interaction was an injection of joy after the Covid isolation years.

We welcome South Link Education Trust as the major sponsor and supporter in 2023. The South Link Education Trust was established in 2003, as a charitable trust whose focus is to support New Zealand General Practice. The Trust has been and remains committed to New Zealand General Practice through its associated organisations Best Practice Advocacy Centre (BPAC), South Link Health Services (SLHS) the New Zealand Medicines Formulary (NZF and NZFc) and its other activities. They have been regular attendees at the GPCME meetings for a number of years.

We will tackle the extremely relevant situation of the GP workforce crisis this year, as primary care continues to be stretched. It has taken a toll on many and many GP leaders will come together to moot this issue on Friday morning. Covid has added to the workload, although the muted usual influenza morbidity and mortality numbers continue to be ignored. RSV and the flu returned with a vengeance this last year.

The programme will commence with a karakia from local iwi, to provide their blessing and as a welcome. This year's Christchurch Memorial Oration will be given by Bay of Plenty GP Jo Scott-Jones, honouring Dr Don Horwood. There will be sessions focussing on caring for ourselves and colleague's health, psychiatry, and mental health. Plenary sessions on offer are on eyes, cardiology, nephrology, gastroenterology, respiratory and infectious disease, genomics and genetics.

A number of sponsored breakfasts will present recovery at work (ACC), workplace bullying and violence (DHAS), optimal CVD management in type 2 diabetes (Eli Lilly), COPD update (GSK), and inequities in asthma (Astra Zeneca). Longer workshops on the Thursday cover dermoscopy and skin cancer surgical skills, diabetes in depth, a day of musculoskeletal training, long-acting contraception and managing abnormal uterine bleeding, the lightning process and more.

On the Thursday there are longer in-depth workshops on dermoscopy and skin cancer surgical skills, a diabetes masterclass, long-acting contraception and abnormal uterine bleeding, a day of musculoskeletal training, the lightning process and more.

On Friday there is a dedicated programme for practice managers as there is on Saturday for practice nurses. They may attend any session of their choice of course though.

The concurrent sessions provide a lot of choice, but do not despair missing out - post conference you can view many sessions online via a password sent to delegates for some months. 2 hr forums on skin cancer, nutrition, neurology, cancer cares, radiology, abdominal pain and bowel cancer innovation are supported by many sponsored speakers. There is a large pot pourri of topics in the workshops, something for everyone. ALS courses are on offer as usual throughout the meeting.

Make sure that you enjoy this meeting, catching up on colleagues from throughout the country, exchanging ideas over lunch or coffee, learning business skills, and picking up practice pearls to modify how you manage your patients from next week. Hopefully you can indulge in some of the local leisure and adventure activities too.

The GPCME Meetings in Rotorua and Christchurch will continue to focus on practical patient management issues and catalysing great social exchanges.

It is wonderful to see you all back again in 2023.

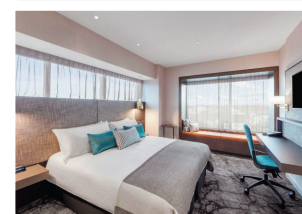

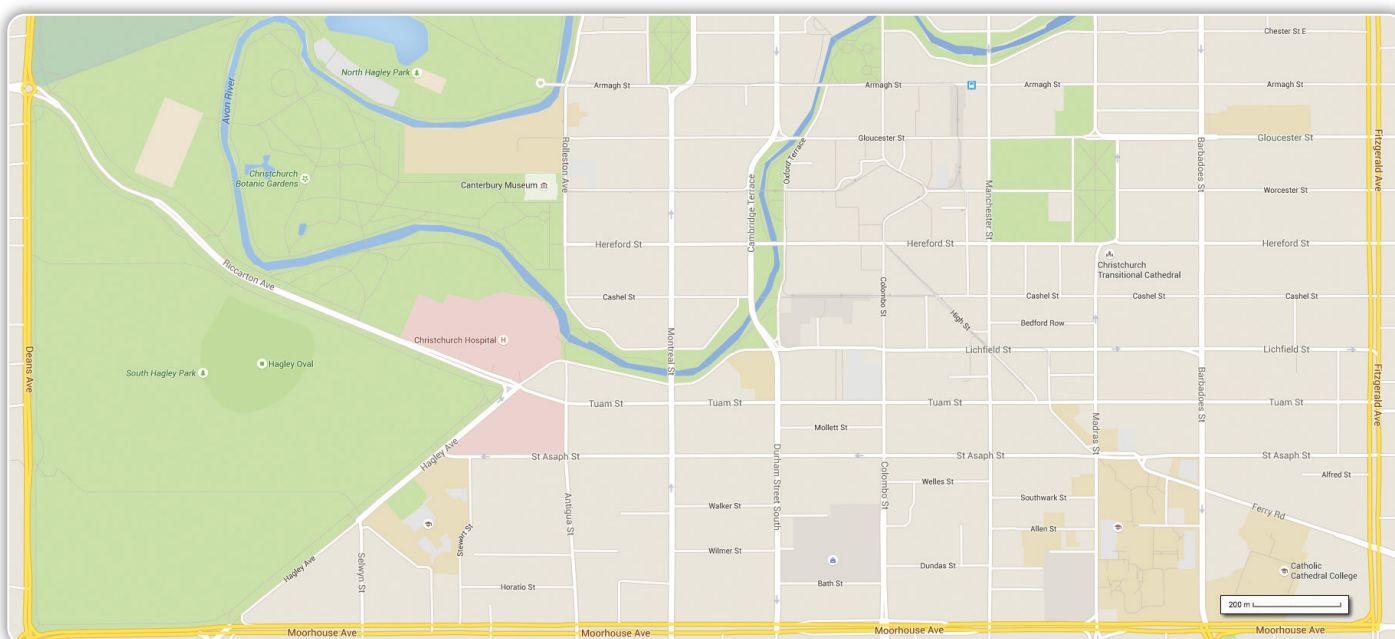
